Over the years I have seen so many changes and have watched the world become more accessible. I look forward to even greater changes in the future.


2 The Lockers - Written by Talia Baskin - Kesselman

Accessibility is more than a ramp.



- Almost 3.8 million Canadians over the age of 15 have a disability
- Less than 50% of people with a disability are employed.
- The accessible Canada act is called "nothing about us, without us"
- What is the difference between service animals & therapy pets?

A therapy pet is trained to provide comfort to people in hospice, disaster areas, retirement homes, hospitals, nursing homes, schools, and more.

A service animal is certified and trained to help people with disabilities, such as visual impairments, autism, seizure disorders, diabetes, etc.

Service animals are taught to push wheelchairs, or guide a blind person, or alert someone in case their master is having a seizure.

Service dogs GO wherever their handlers go.


Therapy dogs are also highly trained, but compared to services animals, are taught to be more socially adjusted to various people.






